What Does Love Look Like? by Mary Solari



As a test, a Pharisee asked Jesus: “Teacher, which is the greatest commandment in the Law?” Jesus replied: “Love the Lord your God with all your heart and with all your soul and with all your mind.’ This is the first and greatest commandment. And the second is like it: ‘Love your neighbor as yourself.’ All the Law and the Prophets hang on these two commandments.” (Matthew 22:36-40)

As imperfect and sinful humans, it’s hard to understand what real love looks like. Since the days of Cain and Abel, siblings, families, friends and nations alike have experienced turmoil. Whether it’s sibling rivalry, desire for power, money or control, mankind has succeeded in harming each other greatly.

With all the bad examples history has taught us, what examples do we have of love? 1 John 3:16-18 tells us: “This is how we know what love is: Jesus Christ laid down his life for us. And we ought to lay down our lives for our

brothers. If anyone has material possessions and sees his brother in need but has no pity on him, how can the love of God be in him? Dear children, let us not love with words or tongue but with actions and in truth.”

To define love even further, we can look at 1 Corinthians 13:4-8 which says: “Love is patient, love is kind. It does not envy, it does not boast, it is not proud. It is not rude, it is not self-seeking, it is not easily angered, it keeps no record of wrongs. Love does not delight in evil but rejoices with the truth. It always protects, always trusts, always hopes, always perseveres. Love never fails.”

Practicing this kind of love may not come easily, but as we draw closer in our relationship with Christ, the love of God will fill our hearts and our actions will then naturally display the fruit of God’s spirit (Galatians 5:22-23). May we strive to live as Paul instructed at Colossians 3:12-14 with compassion and forgiveness, and most importantly, love which binds all virtues together in perfect unity.

Who Raises a Prodigal? by Donna Bramlett



“Good parents have good children; bad parents have bad children.” Ever heard that one? It’s not often verbalized, but it is frequently expressed, in a glance, a “kind” suggestion, in cutting eyes and not-so-hushed whispers.

When I was a young parent with small children, this idea was fed to us in large doses by well-meaning Christian leaders (who also believed it), and I for one swallowed it whole. I firmly believed that if I did everything right, my children would grow smoothly into responsible, godly adults, and of course they would rise up and call me blessed. I never even tasted the hook in that line.

First of all, I can’t do everything right. I’ve tried, but even some of my best attempts turned out to be big flubs. Second, God is not glorified if I get all the credit. If raising children is purely a mathematical formula - good numbers in, good numbers out - where is the need for Christ? But if in my weakness and failure I bring my children to my Father and theirs and plead for their good, He rightfully receives the glory when they do well. Third, I know many families with multiple children, raised by the same parents, in the same home, under the same rules and standards. Yet not all of them turned out the same. There is often a mixture of wise and foolish,

those who choose well and poorly in the same family. What’s up with that? Were they only good parents to some of their children and not others? If so, that would certainly make them bad parents, and the whole dynamic falls apart anyway.

Finally and most compelling of all is a simple truth that radically alters my thinking. My Heavenly Father is all good. There is no darkness or error in Him. He always does right and is always wise, always loving. Yet not all His children do well. Some make a good start and veer off course. Ever hear of sin in the church? As if we haven’t witnessed it ourselves, the Bible is replete with failures of godly men and women. If this great and perfect Father has a mixture of good and bad children, why in the world would I think that I am exempt? The truth is my early confidence was just arrogance. I unknowingly thought myself a better parent than God. But knowing that now and going forward, I look to His example for how to interact with my kids when they stray, loving them unconditionally and hoping for better days. I must trust the faithfulness of our Father as I stand watching for any hint of repentance, running to them while they are still a long way off, eager to embrace and restore. I myself have been the prodigal, and my Father did that for me.

May this New Year be one of fresh grace, given and received.


Wise Men Still Behold Him by Chris Johnson
