More recently our pastor said something that knocked me off my stool. In his sermon about love he mentioned that we should ask the Lord to make us more loving. I have had a relationship with the Lord since I was 22 years old. I have prayed for wisdom, knowledge, discernment, and just about everything you could think of. I tell the Lord my troubles. I confess my faults. I ask for forgiveness and often repent. I praise Him, thank Him and basically share every problem, hope, and desire with Him.

You know what? I couldn't remember if I ever asked Him to help me be more loving. I kind of just thought that was a given. Wow! It was like I was hit with a ton of bricks. Bull's eye right between the eyes. The scriptures tell us if we have not love we are as a tinkling cymbal. I don't want to be a tinkling cymbal! That, my friend, was the Lord's chastisement and correction for me.

extravagance, Solomon made another march up to Gibeon, the great high place, and began to offer a

thousand burnt offerings. He loved the Lord, and he showed it in the same lavish way he had seen from his father David. Solomon went to the highest of high places, as if he were reaching for God with all his might, and the aroma of his sacrifices drifted for miles and lingered for days. The Lord received those sacrifices, but He did not speak to Solomon through the smoke. He waited until Solomon was asleep and appeared in a dream, addressing this opulent king on the same terms He might use with any ordinary man. It had nothing to do with Solomon's royalty.

When He told Solomon to make his request and ask for what he wanted, do you suppose God did not already know Solomon's heart? And here is the point. He wanted Solomon to know his own heart. He had to cut through the royal extravagance and speak to the man, and the man had to answer. I think a subtle but

significant part of this story is what Solomon did when he woke up. "Then Solomon came to Jerusalem and stood before the ark of the covenant of the Lord, and offered up burnt offerings and peace offerings, and made a feast for all his servants." (1 Kings 3:15) Solomon was humbled. Compared to what God had just promised him, his thousand burnt offerings were a pittance. So he left the high place and went into the tent God had designed for that purpose. He offered a reasonable offering, and he made a feast for all his servants. No pomp. No extravagance. Just a humble awareness of his own humanity and gratitude for God's kindness to him. In fact, the first case he presided over was between two prostitutes, a horrific case he could easily have delegated to someone else. And from this place of humility God exalted him to be the greatest, wisest king of all time.

As we partake of our Thanksgiving meal, let us not be concerned with its extravagance - or lack of it. Let's approach this day and this meal with a humble and grateful awareness of our humanity, of God's transcendence, and the kindness and mercy He has lavished on us.
